

**CHAPTER 11 Project Recording Sheet**  
**11 Whooping it Up**

Whooping Cranes reach almost five feet tall when standing and weigh about 14–16 pounds. The adult birds are snow white with black-tipped eight-foot wingspans. Each family group produces one or two offspring. The migration route from Wood Buffalo National Park in northern Alberta province to the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge in Texas is approximately 2400 miles long and only about 140 miles wide. The population of Whooping Cranes was likely never very large. The original population even before the European settlement of North America is estimated to be only 500 to 1400.
